CHANGES TO MICROSOFT PRODUCTS

If you have been following the software industry, you surely have noted the push for subscription services for the various products. If you have studied the differences between a program you download or upload to your computer and one available as a cloud-based subscription, you will see that each has its advantages—for now for a home user--it may come down to cost. But know that very soon these software companies are going to stop supporting/ updating/fixing the products currently in use. The week of October 4th, TechSoup sent out a message that said that as of April 4, 2022, on-premises Microsoft products (meaning downloads) will no longer be available as a donation. This is polite way to say that Microsoft products are being rented (subscription) rather than sold (downloads). This product is called Microsoft 365.

So, if you are a Microsoft Office user and you have software loaded that is say from 2013 or 2016 and if you don't want to pay for a subscription you might want to buy and download the 2019 MS Office from an online source before they disappear. As of October 7th, we were able to find a download of MS Office Professional 2019 for \$57.40.

SEED GRANT: first \$250 of \$500 to Friends of the Public Library of Johnston County and Smithfield to fund the costs of applying for and attaining non-profit status and replacing a moribund FOL with a new, dynamic group.

CHALLENGE GRANT: \$250 to The Friends of the Vanceboro-Craven County Public Library for their project "Catch the Little Free Libraries Bus!" to fund construction of a little free library representing their revitalized Friends group.

CHALLENGE GRANT: \$250 to The Friends of the Lexington Library to fund a free book to every elementary age child that attends the May 7, 2022 Multicultural Festival in Lexington, reaching a new demographic audience in the community.

The 2021 Frannie Ashburn Individual Friend of the Year Award was awarded to Beth Klahre of Southport. She has served as the Friends of the Library Southport & Oak Island Board Secretary since October 2018. This year she led a five-month strategic planning initiative conducted by a nine-member strategic planning sub-committee. After assembling data from the NC State Library, conducting focus groups and surveys to collect the voice of library patrons we serve, and assessing the data, a document called the Voice of the Customer was created. Members of the Board used the VOC to advocate for improved library services in Brunswick County. Beth works tirelessly to advocate for FOLSOI and her leadership was key to its VOC successful completion and presentation to the Brunswick County Commissioners, County Managers, Library Director, Library Trustees and library patrons.

The 2021 Frances B. Reid Group of the Year Award went to Friends of the Library Southport & Oak Island, which supports two branch libraries, raises funds, provides operational support by running programs, maintains a website (folsoi.org), an email platform for 876 subscribers, social media accounts on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter, and writes and submits press releases for the local newspapers and on many community calendars and newsletters. The best examples of the impact FOLSOI had over the past year is its annual report and Voice of the Customer report. FOLSOI recently celebrated its 31st year anniversary at its Annual Meeting on September 21, 2021.
