



Book banning is a hot topic .... some of our Friends are aware of this current issue, some are not, and some are uncomfortable with it. In preparing for Banned Books Week September 18-24, 2022, this may be a subject on which you do some research. As this week gets closer, we hope to offer you more information while also hoping that you educate yourself.

Here are a few suggested articles from United for Libraries:

The United for Libraries Intellectual Freedom Task Force has compiled two new resources to support Trustees and libraries to prepare for program, material, and access challenges.

"Terms and Definitions Related to Intellectual Freedom & Censorship" is a collection that clearly defines the language used relating to intellectual freedom and censorship challenges.

"Materials Challenges: Key Library Policies to Review and Revise" reviews the key components of well-constructed and legal policies and describes the policies that a library should review and/or implement to prepare for the possibility of a materials challenge.

Both Tip Sheets are featured on the United for Libraries resource page "Trustee Resources for Program & Material Challenges."

ALA's "Fight Censorship" resource page includes further information on preparing for and responding to challenges, censorship legislation, how to support intellectual freedom, and more.

# SO THEY MADE YOU THE TREASURER. NOW WHAT? by FONCPL Treasurer Tim Como

If you somehow got volunteered to be the treasurer of your Friends group, but are not really clear what you have let yourself in for, here are a few tips to get you started. You first action will be to sit down with the previous treasurer and get a full turnover in regard to what your duties will be and how they are done. Be sure to take good notes on everything that is said, as you will probably be referring back to them for some time to come. Your group will have a charter with duties and responsibilities of the treasurer spelled out. You will need to review that as well.

You will need the assistance of the previous treasurer or President of your group in transferring check-writing authority. This will have to be done at the bank. You need to be sure that at least two people in your group have check-writing authority and have authority to use the group's charge card, if you have one. If only one person has such responsibility and decides to move on, you will find yourself with a big, big problem. It would be advisable for you to go through the treasurer records for previous years and make yourself a calendar of what expenses and income sources to expect for the coming year. Your group will be depending on you to be aware of anything coming up that may become a financial problem.

If you are a 501 (c)(3), you will need to get familiar with IRS tax form 990-N, which should be submitted every year. It is very easy and takes very little time, but if you fail to do so for three consecutive years, you will lose your tax exempt status.

Other duties for the treasurer will vary depending on the group, but this a bare minimum of what will be required of you. But fear not. Once you have been through it for a few months, it gets easier and easier.
