*The explosion of the Chernobyl nuclear plant in Ukraine occurred on April 26, 1986, which forced everyone within a 300-mile radius to be evacuated.


*For all the car enthusiasts out there, Ford unveiled their first Mustang on April 17, 1964, costing \$2,368.





April is National Poetry Month

Initiated in April 1996 by the <u>Academy of American Poets</u>, <u>National Poetry Month</u> is currently the largest world-wide literary celebration. It encourages booksellers, libraries, poets, publishers, and schools to promote the importance of poetry and its significance to society and culture.

The 2024 poster features artwork by award-winning children's author and illustrator Jack Wong, and lines from "<u>blessing the boats</u>" by beloved poet <u>Lucille Clifton</u>. Wong was selected by Scholastic—the global children's publishing, education, and media company—to create the artwork for this year's poster as part of a <u>new National Poetry Month initiative</u> between the publisher and the Academy of American Poets.

Workshops from Spring of 2021 had several timely videos that we used as resources to get started. We liked "How to Set up a Book Storage Unit"; "DIY StoryWalks® and Beyond"; and "Getting Authors to Speak". Although we haven't gotten a proper storage solution for our book donations, we are exploring several possibilities. We created several StoryWalks® that the community enjoyed, partnering with Kiwanis for Veterans Day, and the town of Shallotte for Earth Day. We made another to use for pollinator gardens. From the Fall 2021 Workshops we learned about logo


design, annual reports, and developing a website. Our logo came from a local high school student, who won a contest for the logo design. facilitated by the high school publications adviser. The annual report has become a key to our work. It allows us to celebrate our accomplishments, explain our income and expenses, and track our activities and goals. Finally, we created a communications committee that developed both a website and newsletter, which we use both to inform and to recruit members.

Finally, **Workshop Spring 2022** helped us very much as we used "Money Matters" to guide us as we revised the By Laws and planned a Memorandum of Understanding with our Brunswick County Library Director. We also revised our budget accordingly, reflecting what we had learned about expenses directly impacting the FOL and those designated for the library purchases. "Money Matters" helped us immeasurably as we tightened our business model and budget.

I hope that if you haven't revisited the website in a while, that you look over the offerings there. Even one small idea can kick start an energetic reimagining of your FOL role in the community.

LARGEST ANCESTRY BY COUNTRY IN EVERY COUNTY



Celebration Days During National Library Week

National Library Week 2024 will be celebrated Sunday, April 7th through Saturday, April 13th. Days of note during that week are:

Monday, April 8: <u>Right to Read Day</u> is a National Day of Action in support of the right to read. The State of America's Libraries Report is released, including Top Ten Most Challenged Books of 2023.

Tuesday, April 9: <u>National Library Workers Day</u>, a day for everyone to recognize the valuable contributions made by library workers.

Wednesday, April 10: <u>National Library Outreach Day</u>, a day the dedicated library professionals who are meeting their patrons where they are.

Thursday, April 11: <u>Take Action for Libraries Day</u>, a day to rally advocates to urge members of Congress to protect the freedom to read.



The theme for National Library Week 2024 (April 7-13) is Ready, Set, Library! National Ambassador for Young People's Literature and Newbery and Pura Belpré-award winning author Meg Medina will serve as 2024 Honorary Chair.

Meg Medina, the 2023–2024 National Ambassador for Young People's Literature, is a Cuban American author who writes for readers of all ages. Her middle-grade novel Merci Suárez Changes Gears received a Newbery Medal and was a New York Times Book Review Notable Children's Book of the Year, among many other distinctions. Its sequel, Merci Suárez Can't Dance, received five starred reviews, while Merci Suárez Plays It Cool received four stars, with Kirkus Reviews calling it "a fabulous finale to a memorable trilogy."

Braille Is Alive, Well, and Ever-Evolving

A few times a day, a strange, pulsating sound fills the Boston headquarters of the National Braille Press. *Thun-thun. Thun-thun.* This is what employees of the nonprofit braille publisher call the office's "braille heartbeat," generated by an assortment of printing presses—50-year-old Heidelbergs and modern big-roll embossers alike—pumping away in the basement, producing books and other reading materials for blind readers.

NBP has been at the forefront of braille publishing since 1927, when it was founded by the blind Italian immigrant **Francis lerardi**—a classmate of **Helen Keller**'s at the Perkins School—as a weekly newspaper serving Boston's blind community. Demand was so great that it went national after just three months. Since then the organization has expanded far beyond a single publication. Today, NBP produces and distributes braille books, reading materials, and technologies for the nation, with clients ranging from individual blind readers to the Library of Congress.

In 1983, NBP launched one of its flagship programs, the Children's Braille Book Club. The first-of-itskind subscription service pioneered the "print/braille" book format by distributing mainstream children's books with added braille.

When *Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows* was published in 2007, NBP drew headlines by hosting a midnight release party, complete with accessible editions of the book. Scholastic sent NBP the manuscript early in order for it to be transcribed, and the office had to cover its windows and employ an armed guard to protect what was at that point the most valuable manuscript in the world. Staff worked around the clock to ensure the braille volumes were ready in time.

Since the 1980s, many blind readers have used electronic braille displays, which have refreshable braille composed of small pins that shift as the reader progresses. Over time, these displays have become more sophisticated and less expensive.

"With an electronic braille display, it's possible to turn a huge number of digital books into braille," Leland said, adding that both the Apple Books and Kindle apps are accessible through these displays. He prefers to read electronic braille and gets most of his digital books from the accessible e-book library Bookshare, as well as the Library of Congress's National Library Service.

"To call hard-copy braille bulky is an understatement," he said. "It takes several hulking volumes in braille to reproduce what in print would be an unassuming paperback." For reference, NBP's braille edition of *Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows* comprised 12 volumes, totaled 1,100 pages, and weighed 12 pounds.






