Hello Friends,

Several Friends groups as well as FONCPL have had some difficulty completing the required paperwork for the Charitable Solicitation Licensing Division. I have asked our Treasurer to attempt to get clarifying instructions from CSL and share them with Friends.

A number of FOL groups have a lot of cash on hand sitting in either a checking account and/or a savings account that earns little to no interest. Remember that you have options! Some Friends chose to place their excess funds in interest-earning CDs that come due on different dates. Some FOLs have placed money with a brokerage firm. Setting up an endowment is an option for some (NC Community Foundation is one agency handling endowments). If your money is in an investment account, don't take it out until it is actually needed as you will lose the interest.

If your library has an outreach department that does craft projects at senior centers and other facilities, one way you can help is to ask the program coordinator for a list of items needed for future craft projects. Share that list with your members and allow them to collect/purchase them directly. Perhaps your Friends might also help set up, assist, and clean up after the program. Friends could run such a program under the auspices of the library. For example, design a musical bingo game to take out with small prizes to the assisted living facilities. This would enable you to actively involve more members.

I hope many of you are participating in your library's adult summer reading program. We must remember that we, too, are library patrons and by participating we are helping their statistics.

Our FONCPL newsletter editor, Kathy Lambe, would love to receive articles and pictures from your FOL. Material is due by the 25th of each month. Mark your calendars!

Legal status of NC Friends of the Library groups

In June the Friends of North Carolina Public Libraries (FONCPL) took our list of 196 known or suspected list of Friends of the Library groups in North Carolina and updated the information we had on them regarding their incorporation status with the state. We also researched their Charitable Solicitation License (or Exemption) status. In addition to that we researched the IRS charitable nonprofit registry site to determine which ones had 501(c)(3) status as well as when they last filed the required 990. (CAVEAT: we had to trust that the information posted online was correct—that may or may not be the case which is why we recommend you do your own research. Due to the different ways that the organization's name may appear—some might have been missed.) Here is a summary of those findings:

- 83% of Friends are incorporated in the state. To protect the Board, every Friends group should be incorporated with the state. Check your status online with the NC Secretary of State <u>Corporations Search</u>.
- 2. 22% of Friends have or have had a Charitable Solicitation License or Exemption and of those 28% are showing as lapsed and one had theirs cancelled. <u>Every Friends group should either have the license or the exemption</u>. Your group must re-apply yearly for this status. The law changed recently so it is easier than ever to obtain the exemption for those with assets of under \$50,000. **DO NOT RECYCLE OLD CSL FORMS!!!** There are new forms. Check the <u>online CSL registry</u> to see if your Friends are in compliance.
- 3. 38% of Friends have IRS 501(c)(3) designations that are current on their 990 forms. 27% have as their last 990 filing 2014 to 2022, making them at risk of revocation. 6% of Friends currently have their IRS nonprofit designation revoked and a number that are currently in compliance have had their designations revoked in the past. IRS 990 forms MUST be filed yearly. Not filing for three consecutive years is cause for revocation of this designation. <u>Click here</u> to check your Friends' IRS status on the Tax Exempt Organization Search page.

What the above points out is that Board members are not fulfilling their fiduciary responsibilities and it may indicate a Treasurer who lacks knowledge of legal requirements. FONCPL strongly recommends that every Friends group existing in NC should: 1) Be incorporated as a nonprofit in the state of NC; 2) have and keep current the group's Charitable Solicitation License or Exemption; and 3) have and keep current the group's 501(c)(3) designation.

Of the 196 known or suspected Friends of the Library groups in NC, only 33% (66) are members of FONCPL. <u>Click here</u> to see if your group is a member. <u>Click here</u> to see the benefits of group membership. We hope your group will join if not currently a member.

It's been 20 years since Nayan Olak opened himself up to emotions — he's thrown his whole self into his labor union, which he now plans to lead. But when a woman from his past, Helen Fletcher, moves in down the street, and a newcomer to the union threatens his victory, he'll have to reckon with secrets long buried.

Our Monthly Censorship Update by Karen Robbins, President, Friends of the Library Rourk Branch FONCPL Board Member

THE CHALLENGE OF BOOK CHALLENGES

How can Friends of the Library help their local library be prepared for possible book challenges? How can the FOL support and advocate for their library during a censorship challenge? The best way is to be educated about what book challenges are, how they happen, how frequently they happen, and what other library groups are doing to help prevent or successfully counter a challenge.

Know The Terminology

<u>Challenge</u>: A challenge is when someone raises an objection to library material or a program or service; effort to remove or restrict access to books, materials, programs or digital information. <u>Reconsideration</u>: A formal reconsideration request is a written document that identifies the specific resource that is of concern and the reasons for reconsidering its inclusion in the library's collection; the formal process libraries go through to determine whether a book meets the library selection criteria.

<u>Ban:</u> <<u>britannica.com</u>> Book banning, "the practice of prohibiting or restricting the reading of certain books by the general public or by members of a local community or religious group. Books can be banned by means of their removal from publicly accessible locations (e.g., libraries), by their destruction (including the burning of printed books), or by making their authorship or distribution a punishable act.

<u>PEN America's Freedom to Read</u> - "action taken against a book based on its content that leads to a previously accessible book being completely removed from availability."

<u>The American Library Association</u> - "removal of a title from a library because someone considers it harmful or dangerous."

Why Some Attempt Censorship

Fear of the unknown Desire to protect Preserve societal norms Control the narrative Avoid mental discomfort Prevent perceived harm

But while understanding the complex reasons people attempt to censor literature, the FOL must always advocate for the freedom to read.

Know The Statistics

NORTH CAROLINA

As of December 2023, NC is among censorship leaders with 58 book bans reported between July 2022 and June 2023.

North Carolina Book Censorship News

- 1. Last fall, during Banned Books Week, the Chapel Hill Library made postcards with stats about book banning. Patrons were asked to send them to legislators, school boards, and library boards.
- 2. Last fall, Charlotte-Mecklenburg schools told principals to ban all "Banned Books Week" events, but after journalists uncovered the story, the district reversed its decision and said it was not violation of the NC Parents Bill of Rights (SB 49.)
- 3. Neighbor South Carolina's legislature adopted, according to <u>The State</u>, "a senate proposal to require county libraries certify they are not offering any books or materials that appeal to sexual interest of children under the age of 17 in children's youth or teen sections of libraries."

EveryLibrary Institute and Book Riot researchers surveyed 1,527 parents and guardians with children under 18 in two surveys during October and November 2023.

Here is a by-the-numbers look at what parents and guardians told researchers about public libraries:

92 % of parents, grandparents, and guardians said they **trust librarians** to curate appropriate books and materials

90% report being comfortable allowing their child to select their own materials

96% said they feel their children are safe within the library

83% agree librarians know what books children love

35% think public librarians have a political agenda, and believe they should

9% do not believe librarians have a political agenda, but think they should

44% don't think librarians have a political agenda, and should not

85% report being satisfied or very satisfied with librarians.

Spamming and Phishing By Judy Hills, FONCL President

We hope that by now your Friends' Board members are skilled at recognizing spamming and phishing. Spam is unsolicited email, instant messages or social media messages. These can cause damage if you open or respond to the message or if you open the attachment. Some look very legitimate, but generally one of two things are dead giveaways that the message is spam: 1) the email address of the sender and 2) the wording of the message.

Phishing is an email sent from and internet criminal disguised as an email from the legitimate, trustworthy source. Phishers may have collected your name and the names of other Board members from your website, making the communication look legitimate. Beware! Clues to help you discern phishing:

- 1. Requests for your username and/or password credible institutions and organizations will not request personal information via email
- 2. Time sensitive threats (e.g., your account will be closed if you do not respond immediately)
- 3. Spelling and grammar mistakes
- 4. Vague or missing information in the "from" field or email signature
- 5. "To" field contains multiple random email address or is alphabetized
- 6. Impersonal or awkward greetings, such as "Dear Mr. account holder"
- 7. Unexpected files or downloads
- 8. Links that don't refer to the sender or sender's organization
- 9. Emails about accounts that you don't have, such as eBay or PayPal, or banks that you don't have accounts with
- 10. Emails "from" celebrities
- 11. Asks you to reply in order to "opt out" of a service or
- 12. Plays on human emotions to evoke sympathy, kindness, fear, worry, anxiety, or excitement.

One scheme that I have encountered both email and mail related to the FONCPL web domain name. If your Friends have a website, it is doubtful you'll remember the name of the company that registered your domain name. The email version is from cpanel and it will say that your domain has reached your disk quota (invokes fear that your domain name is compromised). The mail version—Domain Listings--just sends you what looks like a legitimate invoice. One word of caution: if you don't keep current on your payment for your domain name—the provider will sell it. I have seen a situation where two different nonprofit groups lost their domain names and they were picked up by sexually-oriented enterprises.

And this also brings up the issue of posting online the names and contact information for Board members. There is a plus and minus to this. Groups appear friendlier if they post the info but the information can be used for spamming and phishing. Your group needs to weight the pros and cons.

THE PROPER RULES AND ETIQUETTE FOR FLYING THE AMERICAN FLAG

Brush up on your flag etiquette by learning how to fly the Stars and Stripes the right way.

There's a right and a wrong way to hang the flag vertically.

Don't hang your flag backwards, upside down, or in another inappropriate fashion. If you're hanging your flag vertically, the Union portion with the stars should go on the observer's left.

Avoid letting the flag touch the ground.

Know the difference between half-staff and half-mast.

Half-mast refers to a flag flown on a ship's mast while half-staff describes flags flown on land.

Fly your flag on half-staff at the right times.

The flag is flown at half-staff when the nation is in mourning, such as for the death of government official or for remembrance.

Only fly a flag at night if it is illuminated.

Custom dictates that you should display flags only from sunrise to sunset, but you can keep the stars and stripes flying 24 hours a day if it is properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

Don't fly the flag when it rains.

Always fly the American flag above other flags.

That includes state and city flags.

Dispose of an old flag in a respectful manner.

The Federal Flag Code says that unserviceable flags should be burned in a respectful, ceremonial manner, but do so discreetly so people don't misinterpret your intentions.

Fold your flag before storing it.

Skip clothing and objects with flags on them.

Guidelines in the Flag Code advise against using the flag on clothing, costumes, athletic uniforms, bedding, cushions, handkerchiefs, etc.

Avoid these common flag mistakes, too.

A flag should never touch anything beneath it while it's flying, it should never be used as a covering for a ceiling, and you should never place anything on the flag.

HOUSEKEEPING HOW TO PROPERLY FOLD AN American Flag



Continue until the final folds ensure that only the Union (the blue portion with white stars) is showing and the open edges are folded in.
